





2014 Beach Sweep/River Sweep Inland Annual Report

The 26th annual Beach Sweep/River Sweep, South Carolina cleanup occurred September 20, 2014. For the inland portions of the state there were 31 sites registered by 31 site captains for cleanups in 17 counties of South Carolina.

Data reports were requested from all the site captains; however, there was only partial response with data being reported by 24 site captains; a response rate of 77%. A response was considered to be a communication from a site captain (or site volunteer) reporting the number of volunteers who actually participated, amount of trash collected (by weight and/or bags), and approximate miles covered. Data from the cleanup are presented below. "Reported" data comes from a site captain or volunteer following a cleanup. Other data presented as "registered" reflects information provided by site captains when they registered for participation in the Inland Sweep.

Please note, the numbers presented below do not include the Coastal Sweep sites and volunteers coordinated by the S.C. Sea Grant Consortium. Items Collected

Mostly bottles and cans (beverage type), cigarette butts, take-out food containers, food wrappers, cups and plates, bottle caps, cup lids, plastic grocery bags, other plastic, forks/knives/spoons, straws/stirrers, and bait containers were collected. Also collected were diapers, condoms,

syringes, tobacco wrappers, bottles (non-beverage), tires, large tractor tire, fishing line, fishing sinkers and hooks, construction material, patio table, Big Wheel trikes, child's pool, huge baby doll, various others toys, lawn chairs, mattresses, signs, Power Wheel Princess Car, road cone, buoys, clothing items, cable reel/spool, camping equipment (abandoned), shopping carts, propane tanks, bicycles, computer monitors, wire bundle, furniture, fishing nets, metal fence posts, car parts, and glow sticks.
