Education Programs



This year's Poster theme is Local Heroes/Your Hardworking Pollinators. The Poster Contest is open to all students in grades K-12, students. Birds, bats, bees, butterflies, beetles, and other small mammals that pollinate

plants sustain our ecosystems and produce our natural resources by helping plants reproduce. Without the actions of pollinator's agricultural economies, our food supply, and surrounding landscapes would collapse.



The Youth Photography Contest is open to youth in grades 6th-12th. There are two divisions and four categories (Landscapes, Native Wildlife, Rural Life, and Trees & Plants) to participate in.

"Give a floot and Recycle" Our newest category is on recycling. Create a free standing "OWL" out of recycled or reused materials. The contest is open to children in grades K-12th Students must go to school in Lexington County. Use your imagination, be creative!



The District offers two **Scholarships** to high school seniors who are pursuing a career in the conservation field. The scholarships are in the amounts of \$1000 and \$500.



Teacher of the Year is another contest the District offers. This contest is open to all teachers in grades K-12th who demonstrate conservation education inside and outside the classroom. Nominate your teacher today.

Fourteen Mile Creek Trail Report:

On Wednesday, March 11, 2015 Tina and I took a short lunch walk down at the new Fourteen Mile Creek Trail in Lexington. The trail is two-thirds-mile loop along the north edge of Lexington. The path stretches along and across the creek near North Lake Drive (S.C. 6) and Old Cherokee Road. Parking is available at the Exxon gas station on the corner. After being cold and shut in all winter it was nice to be out in the spring air. The trail is very nice, it is meshed to help grass grow and reduce muddy areas. Along the way you will find informational signage, bridges, benches, picnic tables, and an



outdoor classroom. It's a great place to walk your dog, there are several dog waste stations along the way. Over all a nice place to have a picnic or walk/jog alone or with the family.



Frances Mack Intermediate School After School Program "Communities and Schools for Success"



A year ago Frances Mack Intermediate School in Gaston, South Carolina received a grant for "Communities and Schools for Success" program or as they called it "CS²". This two hour garden project after school program on Tuesdays and Thursdays has encourage students to come to school and decrease the dropout rates.

The Lexington SWCD District is sponsoring their raised garden beds. District Manager Price helped facilitate the garden. Swansea High School FFA helped build the frames for the garden beds. This is the foundation for integrated learning, engaging in real-world experiences. The garden will be used to teach academic skills, social and moral development, and life skills.



The goal for the "CS²" after school program is to give participants a garden area to learn, practice, and experiment with gardening. It will give local organizations, like us, the opportunity to get involved with students helping them become productive members of their community.

USDA Service Center - NRCS Programs - EQIP & CStP



Natural Resources Conservation Service

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) provides financial and technical assistance to agricultural producers to address natural resource concerns and deliver environmental benefits such as improved water and air quality, conserved ground and surface water, reduced soil erosion and sedimentation, or improved wildlife habitat. Those eligible for this cost-share program will receive financial and technical assistance to implement conservation practices, or activities like conservation planning, that address natural resource concerns on their land. Payments are made to participants after conservation practices and activities identified in an EQIP plan of operations are

implemented. EQIP is open to all eligible agricultural producers and submitted applications will be considered and evaluated in multiple funding pool opportunities.

Conservation Stewardship Program (CStP) provides financial and technical assistance to eligible producers to conserve and enhance soil, water, air, and related natural resources on their land. Eligible lands include cropland, grassland, prairie land, improved pastureland, rangeland, nonindustrial private forest lands, agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe, and other private agricultural land on which resource concerns related to agricultural production could be addressed. CSP encourages land stewards to improve their conservation performance by installing and adopting additional activities, and improving, maintaining, and managing existing activities on agricultural land and nonindustrial private forest land.
