



2014 Conservation Farmer of the Year

Tim Phillips is a small, part-time beef cattle farmer who has planted trees to create a wide streamside forest buffer and fenced cows out of his riparian zone. He installed watering facilities in fields on both sides of the stream, which bisects the farm, and a rock stream crossing to access both sides of the farm across the stream, using geotextile fabric and rock. He put up cross fence to improve his rotational grazing system and has documented good nutrient management and environmentally – responsible weed

control. He filled in and planted eroding areas at an old pond site and along his streambank. He used the federal Environmental Quality Incentives Program to reimburse him for part of the cost of these practices. The funds were awarded based on the environmental benefits provided by these practices. His farm is 75 acres total, and there are 36 acres of pasture under the EQIP contract.

Practices completed on contract –

- streamside forest buffer (site prep, tree planting) on perennial stream,
- two livestock water facilities (underground pipeline, water tank and heavy use area under water tank),
- stream crossing of fabric and rock (heavy use area),
- proper application of nutrients (nutrient management on pasture),
- environmentally-responsible use of herbicides (herbaceous weed control),
- fencing out stream and streamside forest buffer,
- cross fencing for rotational grazing,
- stabilizing small gullies and old pond site with critical area seeding of grass.

Many farmers in the county have completed similar practices. Tim's distinguishing factors were that he is a small, part-time farmer who had more resource issues to address, such as the stream dividing his farm and eroding areas, and addressed them well at considerable cost, to him, in time and money. He and his family provided all the labor to plant the trees, erect the fences and install the pipeline and water tank and heavy use area -and it was hot the summer they put in the livestock water!

Currently, we have a conservation poster contest, photo contest, essay contest and bulletin board contest available for all students that attend school or who live in Lancaster County.

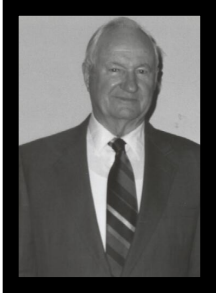

The Conservation District will rank all applications with a points system. The Conservation District prefers that the recipient is majoring in an agricultural or environmental related field such as: agricultural education, agricultural economics, agricultural engineering, agronomy, biology, forestry, horticulture, soils, or wildlife management, but it is not a requirement.

The deadline to apply is **April 2, 2015 at 3:00pm.**

Conservation Districts are subdivisions of state government that work to address natural resource concerns. The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District is committed to improving the quality of life for the citizens of Lancaster County.

The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District consists of a board of five commissioners—three elected in the general election and two appointed by the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources. These commissioners volunteer their time, talents and services to help improve natural resource awareness.

For over sixty years, the Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District has been here to serve YOU! Our conservation district is working for you and your community to promote wise use of our natural resources.

The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District was originally organized as a part of the Catawba Soil and Water Conservation District, which included Chester, Fairfield, Lancaster and York Counties. The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation became a single

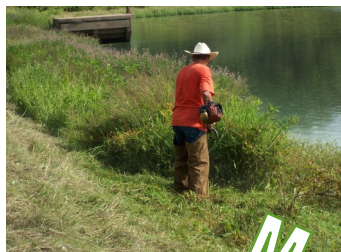




Watershed Boards' Report

The Cane Creek and Little Lynches Watershed Boards' and staff have been working with contractors to complete work on:

- ⇒ Rodent Control: 2014 Ghent Reservoir and Gills Creek, 2015 Little Lynches and Campbell Lake
- ⇒ Spraying Woody Vegetation: Ghent Reservoir and Little Lynches
- ⇒ Annual Maintenance: mowing and fertilizing all watershed dams/spillways
- ⇒ Repairing a small eroded area on Gills Creek and a small depression on Ghent Reservoir

What Is A Watershed Director?

Watershed directors are a dedicated group of volunteers who oversee the five large flood-control lakes in the county. These flood control lakes protect Lancaster County citizens from flooding. Four flood control lakes protect the City of Lancaster, and one protects the Town of Kershaw. The Cane Creek Watershed Board of Directors oversees the four lakes which protect Lancaster, and the Little Lynches Watershed Board of Directors oversees the one which protects Kershaw.

The Directors serve without pay to inspect the lakes' dams and ensure maintenance work is done to keep the dams in good shape. The Directors are elected officials, and their names appear on the ballot in the General Election. The position is non-partisan and they serve because they are concerned about their communities and fellow citizens.

There are five directors on each watershed board. Directors must live in the watershed district they serve. For more information, call the Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District office at (803) 286-4455, extension 100.

No-Fee Services for Landowners and Farmers

Many landowners and farmers may not know of the valuable services available without fees. The Conservation Partnership provides services for free in counties in South Carolina – the local Conservation District, US Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service and SC Department of Natural Resources.

Conservation Districts provide educational programs for schools and community groups. The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District has a variety of programs, and sponsors contests in schools to promote conservation, or wise use, of our natural resources. The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District also offers two scholarships for college students. The Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District provides an aerator for rent to landowners who want to aerate pastures or other lands. Amanda Roberts, District Manager for the Lancaster Soil and Water Conservation District, is certified to oversee hunters education tests.

The US Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) visits farms and properties and provides recommendations for landowners and farmers to improve their property and farming operations. Soils information is available to people who want to buy property or homes that can show how suitable soil is for a particular use. USDA-NRCS has a cost-sharing program to improve the environment on privately-owned agricultural lands.

The SC Department of Natural Resources provides boaters education and hunters education courses, as well as school programs. Once a year, there is a Fishing Rodeo for children in most counties. The Conservation Law Enforcement Division (game wardens) assists landowners and hunters in preventing trespassing and to hunt legally. Game and fisheries biologists provide advice on managing land for wildlife and ponds for fish.

The Clemson Extension Service provides assistance to farmers on grazing and livestock management, pond weed control, wildlife management, and pesticides for home and garden and agricultural use. There is a fee for soil testing. The Home and Garden Information Center has large amounts of information for homeowners.

The SC Forestry Commission (SCFC) evaluates woodland and provides maps and recommendations for timber and wildlife management. The SCFC has a cost-sharing program for tree planting and Southern Pine Beetle control. The agency has small seedlings of many types of trees and shrubs and wildlife plants for sale. SCFC provides wildfire control, and information on tree identification, timber values and tax tips for forest landowners.
