STRANDING CONDITION	INSTRUCTIONS
Stranded sea turtle	Complete an STSSN report and submit online to seaturtlestranding.com. Photograph sea turtle and submit photos with report.
Tagged sea turtle (dead)	Complete an STSSN report and submit online to seaturtlestranding.com. Photograph tag(s). Contact SCDNR for possible necropsy.
Unidentifiable stranded sea turtle	Photograph sea turtle and <b>save entoplastron bone and skull</b> to identify species. Contact SCDNR.
Stranded leatherback sea turtle	Photograph sea turtle and save this sea turtle. Contact SCDNR for possible necropsy.
Sea turtle is entangled or has ingested foreign material	Photograph sea turtle with entanglement in place. Remove entanglement material (if turtle deceased) and photograph it separately. Save entanglement material for SCDNR.
Fresh stranding (absolutely no odor)	Call SCDNR as we may collect this animal for necropsy.
Adult female and adult <b>male</b> sea turtle (all species) >80 cm	<b>Take keratin sample</b> . Contact SCDNR who will collect this animal for necropsy especially males.
