
## LEGISLATIVE REPORT 2024



The South Carolina Department of Public Safety (SCDPS) Officers patrol the state highways enforcing traffic laws. While carrying out their duties, they work to identify violations that contribute to the litter problem in South Carolina. SCDPS Officers work hard to address those persons who choose to litter in our state. The below three (3) year analysis shows the effort made by SCDPS Officers in enforcing the sections of law regarding dumping and littering (16-11-700), escape of materials loaded on vehicles (56-5-4100) and uncovered loads (56-5-4110).


Dumping Litter on private or public property.




Uncovered loads

The South Carolina Department of Probation, Parole & Pardon Services offers public service employment (PSE) as one of its community-based programs. The General Sessions Court has the authority to place convicted nonviolent offenders in unpaid positions with nonprofit or tax-supported agencies to perform a specified number of "community service" work hours. This program is an integral part of SCDPPPS efforts to intervene with supervised offenders by providing them the opportunity to perform useful volunteer work in their community- either as a sentencing alternative, a condition of probation or parole, or a sanction via the violation process. Public service employment enables the community to hold these individuals accountable for their actions through direct service back to the community in which they live.

 133 offenders provided 7,438 public service employment (PSE) hours, picking up litter for 27 organizations during FY '22 and FY '23



## **Statewide Initiatives**





The Golden Trashcan Award is a year-long competition where the focus is not about writing the most littering citations; but rather about our officers strengthening community partnerships, educating the public and youth through outreach events and apprehending the hard to catch littering violators. The winning region receives a celebratory luncheon provided by the Hampton Wildlife Fund and bragging rights.

SCDNR Law Enforcement Region 3 (Aiken, Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, Calhoun, Clarendon, Lexington, Newberry, Orangeburg, Richland, Saluda, & Sumter) were the winners of the 2023 Golden Trashcan Award. They partnered with over 30 organizations to help with litter cleanups, litter enforcement and educational events. South Carolina has a large Hispanic community and Region 3 officers saw a need to help communicate litter laws in Spanish by creating a pocket translator card for each officer; all SCDNR law enforcement officers had a pocket translator by January 2024.


Collectively, 14 tons of trash was relocated from our waterways, roadsides, and illegal dumpsites to an appropriate landfill; officers participated in over 33 outreach events, validated 52 individuals who performed community service, issued 345 warnings and 176 citations for litter violations, and performed 6,473 litter patrol hours.





The data below shows trash pickup as reported by SCDOT to include data from Adopt-A-Highway and/or SCDOT Forces.






# Statistical Information Littering Citations Statewide

Littering is an environmental issue and is often a criminal offense. Enforcing litter laws, court prosecutions and promoting enforcement efforts should help curtail the behaviors associated with littering. The true measurement of effectiveness is to consider the number of citations issued, an increase in the number of participants performing community service and an observable decrease in litter.

Data sources include: all branches of law enforcement and code enforcement officers from local municipalities, county and state.





\*The Litter Commission does not have any recommendations for legislative changes. Several litter-related bills were introduced during the 2024 legislative session:

## H. 3174: Civil Penalty for Litter

The bill would have established a civil penalty for littering, as well as increasing existing penalties for littering offenses on private or public property. The bill was referred to the House Judiciary Committee.

## H. 4712: Yard Debris on Public Highways

The bill would have made it unlawful for a person to knowingly and willfully sweep, blow, move, place, or otherwise deposit yard debris onto a public highway. It established a misdemeanor penalty for violations of not more than a \$100 fine or not more than 30 days imprisonment. This was referred to the House Agriculture, Natural Resources and Environmental Affairs committee.

## S. 1020: Tire Dumping

This bill would have established the crime of illegal tire dumping by making it unlawful for a person, from a vehicle or otherwise, to dump, throw, drop, deposit, discard, spill, place, store, or otherwise dispose of a tire or waste tire upon waters or upon public or private property in the State of which property he is not the legal owner or a person otherwise granted permission by the legal owner including, but not limited to, a highway, park, beach, campground, forest land, recreational area, trailer park, road, street, private dumpster, public dumpster, or alley. The bill provided for misdemeanor and felony offenses for violations.

## H. 3469: Dumping Litter / Penalty Increase

Similar to H. 3174 above, this bill would have increased the penalties associated with dumping litter on private or public property. It included a change that community service associated with a litter violation must be completed in the community in which the violation occurred, raised the monetary penalty associated with violations, and increased maximum imprisonment penalties. The bill was referred to the House Judiciary Committee.

## H. 3962: Escape of Materials Loaded on Vehicles

This bill would have amended the section of the code relating to preventing the escape of materials loaded on vehicles to allow for an exemption to fertilizer and any other products used in farming operations, while also specifying that no vehicle may be operated in a manner that allows the escape of polyethylenes (common plastics), polyolefins, or thermoplastics. This legislation was referred to the House Education and Public Works Committee.



## S. 763 - Waste Tire Legislation Overview (As Amended)

Section 1 of the bill increases the \$150/ton cap on tipping fees that a county may charge to \$400/ton.

- The tipping fee increase and sunset provision in the bill, as amended, represents the work product of all stakeholders who have been involved with this legislation through the SC Scrap Tire Coalition.
- Counties accept scrap tires for recycling that are not subject to an end-of-life fee. By law, counties can currently charge only a maximum of \$150 per ton to manage these undocumented tires a fee that does not cover current processing costs.
- Several counties are facing costs that exceed \$300/ton for collecting, hauling, and processing waste tires, often leaving a shortfall in excess of \$150/ton due to the current tipping fee cap. This has resulted in significant budgetary impacts on county governments due to increasing costs and the lack of grant funds available to fill this gap.

Section 2 of the bill contains language regarding market development with a goal of finding additional ways to use tire-derived products by adding a new subsection (U) to 44-96-170.

- This lays the framework for the stakeholders continuing to work together (via the Scrap Tire Coalition, etc.) to find sustainable statewide infrastructure and uses for tire-derived products.
- It includes reporting requirements from DHEC to the General Assembly on the status of the tire program, fees, and discussions from the working group on a yearly basis.
- The General Assembly can at any time, through legislation, amend/reduce the fee or look at implementing a new type of program that other states have through the review language that is in the code [44-96-170(N]]. SCAC and other stakeholders are working on innovative ways to address the current \$2 fee that has been in place since 1991.

Section 3 of the bill includes a two-year sunset provision following the enactment of the legislation.

• The sunset provision will provide an incentive for all stakeholders to continue working through the SC Scrap Tire Coalition on a comprehensive reform package regarding the current management of waste tires across SC that will be brought to the General Assembly next session for consideration.
